Reading

Isaiah Ch64 v 1-9

Story: If there are any potters amongst you, you will know that if you have some fresh wet clay you can make something useful from it. However if you leave the clay uncovered on a surface for any length of time the clay will dry up and go hard, making it very difficult to mould it into what you want it to be.

That reminds me of what was happening to God's people during the time of the prophet Isaiah. In our Bible reading Isaiah is very upset. He is begging God to come down and change the hearts of his people. Why because they had sinned and turned away from God. They didn't call on God's name any more or plead for his mercy. They just did their own thing and God had become angry with them and turned away from them.

It all sounded pretty hopeless, but Isaiah didn't think so. He knew if the people turned back to God, He would mould them and shape them into what he wanted them to be. Isaiah said to God, "Oh Lord, you're our Father, we're the clay and you are the potter. You formed each one of us by your hand. Please don't be angry with us. Even though our hearts are hard you can still mould us into what you want us to be. You know even today just like the people in Isaiah's day we sometimes wander away from God and our hearts become hard. But rest assured all is not hopeless. If we turn back to God and ask him to forgive us, he will mould us and shape us into what he wants us to be. God is still the potter and we're still the clay! Amen

Reading

Mark Ch13v 24-37

Sermon: Listening to people on the TV you would think that Christmas was cancelled this year because of the restrictions placed on them by the government who are trying to stop the spread of corona virus in a bid not to overwhelm the NHS. But perhaps for the first time in a long-time people might just begin to realise what Christmas is all about. Why there is even a hint in the beginning of the title. However for those of us who know and love Christ as our Saviour this Advent season with the restrictions in place is giving us the opportunity to truly grasp what the second coming of Christ means and to see how our preparation for the end times are coming along. Usually by the beginning of Advent the countdown to Christmas has begun. Even in church the headless chicken race takes over with preparations to decorate the church, organise carol services, think about the Lunch Club dinner, sing in old folks' home and a myriad of other seasonal festive activities. Yes, we might attend an Advent Bible study but if we are totally honest with ourselves delving into God's word is the last thing on our mind it's just another thing to squeeze into an already busy schedule. Cards to be written, presents to be bought and wrapped, food to be baked the list is never ending. We are on the run never taking time to stop. The merry go round just keeps on going.

But not this year. This year is different. We have been forced to stop by something we can't see or control. So, let me draw your attention to Mark 13 v 31 which says, "Heaven and earth will pass away, but my words will never pass away. Even in these dark times we know where our hope lies. In Christ and in his word. God and his word provide the only stability in our unstable world. We should turn away from this temporary world and the need to accumulate its possessions and instead turn to the Bible and its eternal truths.

So how are going to do that you might be asking? Well think about preparation. We've all been on holiday and more often than not we are usually well prepared. We take out travel insurance, pack the right clothing, make sure we have the correct currency, we may even purchase a book that gives us all the information about our destination.

Also, when there's a wedding in the family it doesn't just happen. There's a venue, the photographer, the disc jockey, the florist, the registrar or the church and many other things all to be booked before you start to think of invitations, food, and clothes etc, etc. Now adays many of us even prepare for our death but prepaying for a funeral service, choosing our own hymns and readings. My friend is writing a letter to each of her children and grandchildren to be read by them when she dies.

In everyday life as the boy scout's motto says we are prepared yet can the same be said when it comes to the second coming of our Lord. It's tricky isn't it preparing for something when you don't know the date or time. Due to the pandemic planning for a wedding or a baptism these days it's very tricky as lock down rules keep changing but as Christians preparing for our Lord's return should be second nature because come what may it will happen. So back to God's word the Bible, study it, digest it and more importantly live by its instructions every single moment of your life.

Jesus in his words in Mark 13 v 33 actually tells us how to prepare for his second coming by being alert and be on our guard. But on our guard against what you might ask?

For most of this year we haven't been able to worship together in the church building, but God's work hasn't stopped. There have been services online, phone calls and letters to keep God's people in touch with each other. The building is by the by God's people are the church. Sometimes we put too much stock in bricks and mortar and forget what our mission is. Think about it we can speak about Jesus and his saving grace in any place and in any situation.

Jesus asks us to hold firm to the truth and that means checking to see that those who lead us are God centred not self- centred, are scripture based and spirit led. How many times have we heard people proclaim the end of the time is nigh. Rubbish they don't know when that will happen, they are just guessing don't listen to them.

Our role is to speak the gospel message which isn't always easy in a world where many ignore God. But we should always remember that God is with us and will guide us.

You and I live by faith and for us that means not knowing the whole story, but verse 27 give us such hope. Because at the end times God is going to gather up his elect and take us to be with him.

So, I ask will you watch and endure. Remember we aren't part of a world of quick spiritual fixes or flashy impressive messiahs. Our role is to be on guard and last out. There is no escapism here. Each day we are to take up our cross and follow our Lord and masters' example. Let's always remember that when we die to all that he died, we shall live to all that he rose. Everything that happens to us is projected on the screen of eternity. We are becoming what eternally we shall be. We are called to live now in the light of then. Now that's exciting. Amen.

Prayers Intercession using a labyrinth

Moving into your labyrinth: Pray for the World asking God to change hearts and minds so that all may see the light of Christ


Pray for our country its government and people that in the darkness of the pandemic they will see the light of Christ
