Welcome to the second Sunday of the Advent season. Advent means 'a coming', God coming to His people. Each year the season of Advent provides us, as Christians, with a special opportunity to connect with and celebrate God's unfolding salvation/rescue plan for us and the world He created. Advent has us looking in three directions; looking back to the prophesies of the Old Testament leading to the promised birth of Jesus as Messiah in Bethlehem, looking to the present day and God's salvation work among people now and looking forward to when Jesus will come again in power and glory.



Lighting the Advent Candle:

We light again the first candle in anticipation and feel hope rising up within us. We name it **HOPE**.

We choose to be a peaceful presence in the midst of a frantic and anxious world. So today, we light the second candle as an act of preparation and call it **PEACE**.

A Prayer for Peace (Advent 2)

Heavenly Father, You are the God who gives peace. This second week of Advent causes us to remember that because of Jesus we can experience peace this Christmas, released from turmoil, anxiety and chaos. Reading: Luke 1: 26-38

²⁶ In the sixth month of Elizabeth's pregnancy, God sent the angel Gabriel to Nazareth, a town in Galilee, ²⁷ to a virgin pledged to be married to a man named Joseph, a descendant of David. The virgin's name was Mary. ²⁸ The angel went to her and said, 'Greetings, you who are highly favoured! The Lord is with you.'

²⁹ Mary was greatly troubled at his words and wondered what kind of greeting this might be. ³⁰ But the angel said to her, 'Do not be afraid, Mary, you have found favour with God. ³¹ You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call him Jesus. ³² He will be great and will be called

the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give him the throne of his father David, ³³ and he will reign over Jacob's descendants for ever; his kingdom will never end.'

³⁴ 'How will this be,' Mary asked the angel, 'since I am a virgin?'

³⁵ The angel answered, 'The Holy Spirit will come on you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. So the holy one to be born will be called the Son of God. ³⁶ Even Elizabeth your relative is going to have a child in her old age, and she who was said to be unable to conceive is in her sixth month. ³⁷ For no word from God will ever fail.'

A time to pause, read again, pray, and reflect.

Preaching notes:

In the short time that the angel visits with Mary her world is turned completely upside down, From an ordinary girl looking forward to her marriage to Joseph to bearing a son who will be the Son of God and reign over Israel with a kingdom that will never end, (verses 32, 33). The angel Gabriel' greeting to Mary is very different to that of Zechariah, as we ourselves would speak differently to a young girl in comparison to a mature and experienced priest. Notice their reactions to the news that they (Zechariah and Mary) have been chosen to play their part in God's spectacular redemption plan. They both have questions: Zechariah "how can I be sure of this....?" and Mary: "how will this be...?" but notice that

Zechariah's question is one of trust and lack of belief (even though he is in the temple performing a religious ritual) therefore has a different outcome (verse 20) to Mary's.

"These are stupendous claims" (Wilcock) that are made for this unborn baby (verses 32,33) and if you use a Bible with verse cross references you will see the very many Old Testament sections that this refers to.

When reading this passage in particular and the whole of Luke chapter 1 in general do you feel the sense of excitement and anticipation jumping out of the pages at you? Perhaps also, in addition to the excitement, a sense of awe that this is God's plan for the salvation of mankind which has been slowly unfolding over hundreds of years and is now taking place and trust in knowing that we are called to participate.

The miraculous birth of a child to a virgin is an integral part of this account, to try and explain it humanly, biologically or in a way that revises the translation undermines the authority and the magnitude of the event. God, who brought the world and the universe into being, is certainly able to have a woman conceive without the natural process -isn't that the point of miracles (the supernatural)?

To conclude, we who are living through anxious times, separated from loved ones and perhaps fearful for the future can be comforted by the peace that we feel coming from Mary (verse 38). The rejection and ridicule that she will face from her family, the hard times ahead with Joseph, yet God is with her now and forever. **Amen**
