Scripture Reading: Luke 2:25-32. Now there was a man in Jerusalem called Simeon, who was righteous and devout. He was waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was on him. It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not die before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. Moved by the Spirit, he went into the temple courts. When the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the custom of the Law required, Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying: 'Sovereign Lord, as you have promised, you may now dismiss your servant in peace. For my eyes have seen your salvation, which you have prepared in the sight of all nations: a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory of your people Israel.'

Reflection: Simeon is described as "righteous and devout", he has accepted the Holy Spirit in his life as we hear about God's revelation and guidance through His Holy Spirit. God has made a promise to Simeon and as he takes the baby Jesus into his arms he praises God. Jesus is the salvation offer for all, not just for some. Simeon's blessing and prophesy is an integral part of our Christmas narrative, he testifies that this baby is God's Messiah come at last to reconcile and save people from their sins, to heal and console those in pain and suffering separation. Jesus is a light for you and me, a light that provides us with revelation. May we be as prepared in this year ahead as Simeon was in his time -for the coming of the Lord.
