Sunday 24th January 2021 - Rev'd Phillip Dixon - "The Path of Suffering" Luke 9: 51-62



Scripture Reading: Luke 9:51-62

⁵¹ When the days drew near for him to be taken up, he set his face to go to Jerusalem. ⁵² And he sent messengers ahead of him. On their way they entered a village of the Samaritans to make ready

for him; ⁵³ but they did not receive him, because his face was set toward Jerusalem. ⁵⁴ When his disciples James and John saw it, they said, "Lord, do you want us to command fire to come down from heaven and consume them?" ⁵⁵ But he turned and rebuked them. ⁵⁶ Then they went on to another village.

⁵⁷ As they were going along the road, someone said to him, "I will follow you wherever you go." ⁵⁸ And Jesus said to him, "Foxes have holes, and birds of the air have nests; but the Son of Man has nowhere to lay his head." ⁵⁹ To another he said, "Follow me." But he said, "Lord, first let me go and bury my father." ⁶⁰ But Jesus said to him, "Let the dead bury their own dead; but as for you, go and proclaim the kingdom of God." ⁶¹ Another said, "I will follow you, Lord; but let me first say farewell to those at my home." ⁶² Jesus said to him, "No one who puts a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God." NRSV

A time to pause, read again, pray, and reflect.

Preaching Notes:

Verse 51 is, for many Christians, a highly significant turning point in the life and mission of Jesus. To "set your face" to do something is an idiom that speaks of a firm and unshakable resolve, nothing will divert Jesus from the reconciliation work between God and man that He has been born to achieve. If Luke's gospel were in two parts this may well qualify for being the start of "Part 2".

By reading the gospel as a whole, as a continuing narrative, we can begin to understand exactly how the birth, life, death and resurrection of Jesus saves us from a life of sin (lesser than how God intended us to live) and brings us into a perfect relationship with him and one another. Without this overarching view of the whole, the individual parts cannot be truly understood. Recall the words of the angel Gabriel from the nativity account (Luke 1:37), "for nothing is impossible for God" or the prophesy spoken by Zechariah, "He has raised up a mighty saviour for

us" (Luke 1:69) and the stated purpose of the birth of John the Baptist as one, "Preparing the way of the Lord, to make his paths straight" (Luke 3:4 quoting Isaiah 40:3). This often spoken of "path" or "way" is a "path of suffering", one which stretches back to his birth as Simeon reminds us in the temple, "This child is destined for the falling and rising of many...a sign that will be opposed so that the inner thoughts of many will be exposed" (Luke 2:34,35). This "path of suffering" leads onwards to Jerusalem and the cross, there are no short cuts or easy ways to glory, Jesus is our guide and teacher and if we follow Him we are His true disciples.

Like us, James and John are still learning and when they ask Jesus to call down fire from heaven (verse 54) they are indignant (perhaps even prideful) seeking instant punishment of the village without understanding God's abundant mercy. "The Lord is not slow about His promise, as some count slowness, but is patient toward you, not wishing for any to perish but for all to come to repentance" (2 Peter 3:9) and Romans 12: 14 and 17-21, "Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse...Never pay back evil for evil to anyone. Respect what is right in the sight of all men. If possible, so far as it depends on you, be at peace with all men. Never take your own revenge, beloved, but leave room for the wrath of God." If we wish to learn the lesson of how to react to rejection we must listen to Jesus and not the James and John from this passage. Jesus tells us to shake the dust from our shoes and move on, not with bitterness or anger but with determination for the tasks ahead ("then they went on to another village"). The story that Jesus tells of the barren fig tree (Luke 13:6-9) can also be very helpful to inform us about dealing with rejection and unfruitfulness in our lives.

The commentary from Precept Austin states, "Living as we do in a culture that is seething with anger and that elevates pride to a virtue, we can have some great opportunities for witness if we will learn the lessons of humility and love (from Jesus) for others. If you are mistreated, but you respond with humility and love, you will stand out

as a light in the darkness. Be ready to let others know that it is Christ in you that makes the real difference."

From verse 57 onwards we encounter three "would-be" followers of Jesus. They have a "form of Godliness" but as we learn, lack the commitment and wholeheartedness to put Jesus first. We recall some very significant verses from a previous week, "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross daily and follow me. For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me will save it. What good is it for someone to gain the whole world, and yet lose or forfeit their very self?" (Luke: 25-25). From an earlier theme we learn of true love and devotion from Ruth to Naomi, "Do not urge me to leave you or turn back from following you; for where you go, I will go, and where you lodge, I will lodge...your God will be my God". (Ruth 1:16).

William Barclay commenting on these three men states, "Before you follow Jesus, count the cost. No one can ever claim to have been induced to follow Jesus under false pretences". True discipleship is costly, yet it provides a joy and fulfilment that comes only from devotion and faithfulness to God, remember that offering up our lives is just that -an offering, it will be God who uses our lives for His purposes, we must trust Him. The words of "Lord, first let me..." and the excuses may seem reasonable to our ears but they indicate the hearts of these men being toward other things. Barclay goes on to explain that Jesus was not interested in popularity or numbers but being placed first. He sees the innermost desires of all men, He looks at hearts, desires and truly knows our desires and motives.

We conclude with the words of Dr Rod Mattoon, "We can still hear the heartbeat of Christians like Adoniram Judson, William Carey, David Livingstone, D.L. Moody, John Wesley, Fanny Crosby, Charles Spurgeon, and George Mueller. The list goes on and on. They gave the Lord a blank cheque to their lives by saying and doing, "Lord I will follow thee wherever you go." **Amen**

Offering: Had we been meeting physically this is the point when we would have taken up our offering for God's work. Perhaps this is a good opportunity for us to be reminded that our participation in the work of God's kingdom must continue. Neither fire, flood nor indeed pestilence will detract us from answering the needs of our community. In these times of greater need and falling income from other sources thank you to those who continue with their sacrificial giving. Your treasurer (Kate Philips for Bransgore and Ken Sidding for Highcliffe) will be pleased to give you any advice on ways to continue or increase your weekly giving.

Prayer: Lord we offer up our gifts, all things come from You and from Your hand we have gratefully received, at this time of giving, Lord we gladly and faithfully bring our offering for Your work. **Amen**

The story of a reluctant disciple:

You have probably never heard of Albert McMakin but his commitment and love of Christ led another man to discipleship who was to have a significant effect for God's kingdom. "Albert was a 24-year-old farmer who had recently come to know Jesus. He was so full of enthusiasm that he filled a truck with people and took them to a meeting to hear about Jesus. There was a good-looking farmer's son whom he was especially keen to get to a meeting but this young man was hard to persuade. He was busy falling in and out of love with different girls and did not seem to be attracted to Christianity. Eventually Albert McMakin managed to persuade him to come by asking him to drive the truck. When they arrived, Albert's guest decided to listen in and was 'spellbound' and began to have thoughts he had never known before. He began to attend the meetings and went back again and again until one night, he went forward and gave his life to Jesus Christ. That young man, the driver of the truck, was Billy Graham. The year was 1934. Billy Graham in his lifetime led many thousands to faith in Jesus Christ".

It is always very special when someone we know comes to Christ. Many of us have friends and family who have little or no connection with our Saviour Jesus and we should constantly look for ways of sharing our faith. Albert McMakin no doubt led many to Christ in addition to Billy Graham, in this life our faithfulness in making disciples may not be recognised but we can be assured that in heaven we will meet face to face those who have come to have a lasting and saving relationship with Jesus because we were obedient to our calling to "make disciples". We humbly ask your blessing on the families and friends of all those known to us and those known only to you whose dear ones have departed this life in recent weeks. We thank you for the Communion of Saints and for the lives and witness of those of the Highcliffe and Bransgore fellowships who have passed to be with you. Lord, in your mercy, **hear our prayer.**
