John 2:13-22 Jesus Cleanses the Temple

The Passover of the Jews was near, and Jesus went up to Jerusalem. In the temple he found people selling cattle, sheep, and doves, and the money changers seated at their tables. Making a whip of cords, he drove all of them out of the temple, both the sheep and the cattle. He also poured out the coins of the money changers and overturned their tables. He told those who were selling the doves, "Take these things out of here! Stop making my Father's house a marketplace!" His disciples remembered that it was written, "Zeal for your house will consume me." The Jews then said to him, "What sign can you show us for doing this?" Jesus answered them, "Destroy this temple, and in three days I will raise it up." The Jews then said, "This temple has been under construction for forty-six years, and will you raise it up in three days?" But he was speaking of the temple of his body. After he was raised from the dead, his disciples remembered that he had said this; and they believed the scripture and the word that Jesus had spoken.



Prayer: On this third Sunday in Lent if we had been in the church building a money purse and whip would have been added to the Lent cross as a reminder of the cleansing of the temple. Help us to consider what is valuable and precious to us, within our Christian life and how that links to the world around us.



**God of wisdom help us to love you and your ways: protect the lives and reputations of those around us, cherish the relationships entrusted to us, and learn the value of your sufficient grace. In Jesus name. Amen**

Thought on the reading:

Jesus performed actions as signs of a deeper truth. Recording these signs was important to John to help the Early Church to understand and interpret what had happened. We read that the disciples 'remembered that he had said this' (v.22), that the words of Jesus were handed on to us by those present, and that this was how the theology of the earliest Christian communities was worked out. In the other gospels this episode comes later, but John puts it towards the beginning because for him it is of major significance. In Matthew, attention is on the desecration of the Temple. Instead of a place of prayer and worship, it has been overtaken by commercial activity where laws of financial reward and profit supersede the law of love. While this is true for John, the principal meaning is found in Jesus' answer to the question for a sign. The Jews ask Jesus for a sign to 'prove' his authority. He replies that the new temple will consist of his body after the resurrection. His death and resurrection later gave Christian worship its context and meaning. We remember Jesus' words to the Samaritan woman: that the day would come when people would worship God neither on Mount Gerizim (favoured by the Samaritans) nor in Jerusalem (favoured by the Jews), for true worship would be offered in spirit and in truth (John 4.23). However, the Jews heard that he wanted to destroy the Temple, on which construction work was still under way. They failed to understand that worship of God can never be dependent on physical properties alone but on Jesus' love and life in the believer. If these are absent when we engage in worship, we talk to ourselves rather than communicate with God.

we pray for those institutions we have in our lives:  
for our friends, families, and colleagues; for our local communities,

If so, does he say anything to you? Or do you say anything to HIM? Take your time, there is no rush.
