Sunday 14th March 2021 Fourth Sunday of Lent Mothering Sunday, Diana Middleditch: "Encounters with Jesus – The Samaritan Woman" John 4: 1-26.

Mothering Sunday is a special day in Lent when we consider particularly the importance of birth, nurture, family and our roots. Popular culture has named it "Mothers' Day" but it has its origins and deep Christian significance in those, working away from home, visiting their mother church and families as a part of their Lenten devotion. This day can raise a lot of different emotions, both joy and pain. Memories of mothers no longer with us, mothers who lacked warmth and nurture and thanks for those who have been like a mother to us. Today we remember the mothers who have experienced the deep pain of losing a child, women who were unable to become a mother and the pain of separated families.

Opening words: Today, as in the past, many bunches of flowers will be given in love to mothers and those who have been motherly: bought in shops, picked on the wayside or grown in the garden.

Scripture Reading: John 4: 1-26

Now Jesus learned that the Pharisees had heard that he was gaining and baptizing more disciples than John— although in fact it was not Jesus who baptized, but his disciples. So he left Judea and went back once more to Galilee.

Now he had to go through Samaria. So he came to a town in Samaria called Sychar, near the plot of ground Jacob had given to his son Joseph. Jacob's well was there, and Jesus, tired as he was from the journey, sat down by the well. It was about noon.

When a Samaritan woman came to draw water, Jesus said to her, "Will you give me a drink?" (His disciples had gone into the town to buy food.)

The Samaritan woman said to him, "You are a Jew and I am a Samaritan woman. How can you ask me for a drink?" (For Jews do not associate with Samaritans.)

Jesus answered her, "If you knew the gift of God and who it is that asks you for a drink, you would have asked him and he would have given you living water."

"Sir," the woman said, "you have nothing to draw with and the well is deep. Where can you get this living water? Are you greater than our father Jacob, who gave us the well and drank from it himself, as did also his sons and his livestock?" Jesus answered, "Everyone who drinks this water will be thirsty again, but whoever drinks the water I give them will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give them will become in them a spring of water welling up to eternal life."

The woman said to him, "Sir, give me this water so that I won't get thirsty and have to keep coming here to draw water."

He told her, "Go, call your husband and come back."

"I have no husband," she replied.

Jesus said to her, "You are right when you say you have no husband. The fact is, you have had five husbands, and the man you now have is not your husband. What you have just said is quite true."

"Sir," the woman said, "I can see that you are a prophet. Our ancestors worshiped on this mountain, but you Jews claim that the place where we must worship is in Jerusalem."

"Woman," Jesus replied, "believe me, a time is coming when you will worship the Father neither on this mountain nor in Jerusalem. You Samaritans worship what you do not know; we worship what we do know, for salvation is from the Jews. Yet a time is coming and has now come when the true worshipers will worship the Father in the Spirit and in truth, for they are the kind of worshipers the Father seeks. God is spirit, and his worshipers must worship in the Spirit and in truth."

The woman said, "I know that Messiah" (called Christ) "is coming. When he comes, he will explain everything to us."

Then Jesus declared, "I, the one speaking to you—I am he." New International Version

A time to pause, read again, pray, and reflect.

Preaching Notes: these notes are a supplement to the weekly video which can be viewed on our YouTube channel.

Today Samaritans have become world famous for being an organisation that helps people in

extreme distress. They listen; they talk calmly and help people see a way forward. The irony of their name "The Samaritans" is that these people were hated by the 1st century Jews. But here in John's Gospel the Samaritans are important, and this is the passage that makes them so.

Jesus is already known as a holy man, he is the man that is going to bring Israel back to God. However if we take a look at the whole diorama it is a bit like when newspapers ask if you can see what is wrong in a particular picture. They don't mean it is a bad picture they are just saying that something in the picture that is unusual doesn't ring true. In this diorama things are not as they should be.

- 1. We have a man.
- 2. We have a Samaritan woman.
- 3. We have them together talking.

The first problem with this is that Jesus should not be approaching this woman for many reasons, she is alone without father, brother or husband and therefore men would not want to be alone with a woman never mind talk to such a person. Secondly she is a Samaritan, a sworn enemy of the Jews and a woman of bad reputation. She has been married five times and is now living with a man that is not her husband. She should not be out at this time of day but she is as she is trying to avoid seeing anyone. She certainly did not want to start up a conversation with anyone.

Here is this man asking her for a drink and also says she should ask him for a drink. It becomes obvious as Jesus talks with this woman that he is well aware of her circumstances and that is why he offers her the living water. He is offering her water that will mean that she is never thirsty again. This spring of water will refresh her and give her new life.

If we think about this woman's past and the number of times she had tried to start again, five husbands are evidence of that, you can understand why she would give up trying to change her life but here was a man offering her "new" life, she doesn't know exactly what he is talking about but she does realise that she wants to know more. Jesus now says to her to go and call your husband – even although he knew she did not have a husband. Was he trying to trip her up or was he just trying to point out her sin. He is beginning to remove the mask this woman is wearing, and touches who she really is. The whole reason she was getting water around noon and not early in the morning or in the evening was because she was avoiding other people. She was seen as a very sinful woman.

She tries to throw up a smokescreen between her and the Messiah. She changes the subject and tries to lure him away from her sin.

We all know it is not easy to confront our failures, our disappointments, our pain, and to hope again is scary. If we begin to hope again we can be disappointed again.

However scary it might be, to make a new start is exactly what the Bible is promising "If anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation, the old has gone and the new is here" (2 Cor 5:17).

But what happens with this new creation? What happens to us after we get this chance at a new beginning?

When we make that decision to give ourselves to Christ and he begins that work of recreation in us we become His ambassadors, we are entrusted with the message of reconciliation. Suddenly our lives have a purpose.

The woman at the well eventually realises that she has encountered and personally talked with the Messiah. She begins to change; she no longer sees herself as a hopeless outcast. Instead, she realises that she has been entrusted with a message, with wonderful good news. The Messiah is here.

This woman who walked to the well, walked to the well without a friend, without hope, without a future, this very woman runs back to town telling everyone she has met the Messiah. She tells the people "Come see a man who told me everything I ever did, could this be the Christ". It was because of this woman's testimony---- "He told me everything I did"----- that many of the Samaritans from the town came to him. Because of his words, many more became believers. When we meet Jesus as our personal Messiah, then our lives are filled with a deeper purpose, then we become His ambassadors, then we are entrusted with the message of reconciliation.

I could ask you the question "Where does this message leave us today?" but I won't, the question I am going to ask is this, "Where does this message find us today?"

Well it doesn't really matter where you are today, because today is a new day.

Today is a new day. Jesus is offering you what he offered the woman at the well - a new creation, living water.
