Sunday 20th June 2021, Bible Month Week 3 "Eyes Opened"

These written worship sheets are provided for you to use as we gather as one, in our homes and in our church buildings to worship God. My hope is that for all of us, those who attend the in-person worship and for those who don't, that these sheets can accompany us as we go through the week. To pray, read and reflect on this time of worship together and nurture us in the days ahead, not just on Sunday. This week we are in the third part of the Bible Month series using Mark's Gospel, with the subtitle of "Eyes Opened" using Mark 8 11-26.

A time of quiet to hear what God may be saying to us.

Father God, forgive our sins and renew us in the name of Jesus Christ our Saviour.

Scripture Reading: Mark 8: 11-26

¹¹ The Pharisees came and began to question Jesus. To test him, they asked him for a sign from heaven. ¹² He sighed deeply and said, 'Why does this generation ask for a sign? Truly I tell you, no sign will be given to it.' ¹³ Then he left them, got back into the boat and crossed to the other side.

¹⁴ The disciples had forgotten to bring bread, except for one loaf they had with them in the boat. ¹⁵ 'Be careful,' Jesus warned them. 'Watch out for the yeast of the Pharisees and that of Herod.'

¹⁶ They discussed this with one another and said, 'It is because we have no bread.'

¹⁷ Aware of their discussion, Jesus asked them: 'Why are you talking about having no bread? Do you still not see or understand? Are your hearts hardened? ¹⁸ Do you have eyes but fail to see, and ears but fail to hear? And don't you remember? ¹⁹ When I broke the five loaves for the five thousand, how many basketfuls of pieces did you pick up?'

'Twelve,' they replied.

²⁰ 'And when I broke the seven loaves for the four thousand, how many basketfuls of pieces did you pick up?' They answered, 'Seven.'

²¹ He said to them, 'Do you still not understand?'

²² They came to Bethsaida, and some people brought a blind man and begged Jesus to touch him. ²³ He took the blind man by the hand and led him outside the village. When he had spat on the man's eyes and put his hands on him, Jesus asked, 'Do you see anything?'

²⁴ He looked up and said, 'I see people; they look like trees walking around.'

²⁵ Once more Jesus put his hands on the man's eyes. Then his eyes were opened, his sight was restored, and he saw everything clearly. ²⁶ Jesus sent him home, saying, 'Don't even go into the village.' New International Edition UK (NIVUK).

A time to pause, read again, pray, and reflect.

Preaching Notes: The religious leaders of the day, the Pharisees, have come to Jesus to argue and demand a sign from heaven. With the miracles that have already taken place, often in the presence of the Pharisees themselves, why do they ask for a sign in this specific way? And, given all that Jesus has already done why does he not just give them what they ask for?

Despite all that Jesus has done and continues to do, despite the love and generosity he has shown to those who are brought to him, there is a demand for more proof. Note in verse 37 of chapter 7 following Jesus healing the deaf man, they were astounded beyond measure saying, 'He has done everything well he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak.' Jesus has healed people and overcome demons as acts of love and compassion not 'to prove a point.' God is not to be put to the test (Deuteronomy 6:16).

Jesus could be speaking to us today we he asks 'why does this generation ask for a sign?' It is a spiritual blindness that exists, a hardness of the heart. "Eyes Opened" is a revelation to the heart rather than a physical act and this exchange with the Pharisees (verses 11-13) makes the perfect starting for what comes next in this passage. The 'sighing deeply' is a point of grief, disappointment and a realisation that the hardness of heart of the Pharisees went very deep. Those who should know who he is are blind to him. Every word or phrase is of value, notice that Jesus 'leaves them' just as today he will silently, humbly and often unnoticed depart from people and situations where hard heartedness and arguments are taking place. In a Christian context -it must not be so!

Verses 14 to 21 show that Jesus is contending not only with the unfaithfulness and unwillingness of the religious leaders to lay aside their man-made rules but also with the disciples who are faithful yet slow to understand and still with their minds on the practical and physical. The time they are spending with Jesus -in the same way as we should- is a gradual and growing awareness of who he is, like a clearing of the mist. The discussion about bread is a good example of the practical meeting the spiritual. Jesus is talking to them about yeast in the context of it being a pervading influence on people's faith in God, the veast of the Pharisees being their teaching and attitude and the yeast of Herod being his love of power and people pleasing. The disciples meanwhile are asking, who brought the lunch? Jesus is rebuking them, as they required at that time, laying question after question on them, remember, the Lord rebukes those he loves (Proverbs 3:12).

The Pharisees and Herod are brought into an unusual alignment by Jesus. Their influence is both subtle and dangerous and can still be found in the church today. An overt religiosity, love of position, rules based rather than people loving, mixed with (as with Herod) glimmers and possibilities of interest (he liked to hear John the Baptist) but so easily drawn aside to darkness, pride and self-esteem.

'Do you still yet understand'? Jesus reminds them of previous 'no bread' situations and God's generosity and abundance (what was needed plus more). All of this leads to the actual physical healing of the blind man. Personally led out of the village and healed by Jesus. Eyes opened, restored physically and spiritually, now 'seeing everything clearly'. A parting word from Jesus to avoid the crowds, those seeking a sensational story or further proofs/signs. Just go to your family and celebrate your restoration. **Amen.** Written by Phillip Dixon

Accept these prayers in the name of Jesus, our Lord and Saviour. **Amen.**
