


Highcliffe and Bransgore Methodist Churches



Scripture Reading: Luke 10: 1-24

After this the Lord appointed seventytwo others and sent them two by two ahead of him to every town and place where he was about to go. ² He told them, "The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field. ³ Go! I am sending you out like lambs among wolves. ⁴ Do not take a purse or bag or sandals; and do not greet anyone on the road.

⁵ "When you enter a house, first say, 'Peace to this house.' ⁶ If someone who promotes peace is there, your peace will rest on them; if not, it will return to you. ⁷ Stay there, eating and drinking whatever they give you, for the worker deserves his wages. Do not move around from house to house.

⁸ "When you enter a town and are welcomed, eat what is offered to you. ⁹ Heal the sick who are there and tell them, 'The kingdom of God has come near to you.' ¹⁰ But when you enter a town and are not welcomed, go into its streets and say, ¹¹ 'Even the dust of your town we wipe from our feet as a warning to you. Yet be sure of this: The kingdom of God has come near.' ¹² I tell you, it will be more bearable on that day for Sodom than for that town.

¹³ "Woe to you, Chorazin! Woe to you, Bethsaida! For if the miracles that were performed in you had been performed in Tyre and Sidon, they would have repented long ago, sitting in sackcloth and ashes. ¹⁴ But it will be more bearable for Tyre and Sidon at the judgment than for you. ¹⁵ And you, Capernaum, will you be lifted to the heavens? No, you will go down to Hades.

¹⁶ "Whoever listens to you listens to me; whoever rejects you rejects me; but whoever rejects me rejects him who sent me."

¹⁷ The seventy-two returned with joy and said, "Lord, even the demons submit to us in your name."

¹⁸ He replied, "I saw Satan fall like lightning from heaven. ¹⁹ I have given you authority to trample on snakes and scorpions and to overcome all the power of the enemy; nothing will harm you. ²⁰ However, do not rejoice that the spirits submit to you, but rejoice that your names are written in heaven."

²¹ At that time Jesus, full of joy through the Holy Spirit, said, "I praise you, Father, Lord of heaven and earth, because you have hidden these things from the wise and learned, and revealed them to little children. Yes, Father, for this is what you were pleased to do.

²² "All things have been committed to me by my Father. No one knows who the Son is except the Father, and no one knows who the Father is except the Son and those to whom the Son chooses to reveal him."

²³ Then he turned to his disciples and said privately, "Blessed are the eyes that see what you see. ²⁴ For I tell you that many prophets and kings wanted to see what you see but did not see it, and to hear what you hear but did not hear it." New International Version.

A time to pause, read again, pray, and reflect.

Preaching Notes:

Those who have studied behavioral science or management theory may recognise the "forming, storming, norming and performing" stages that are contained within these passages. Long before the "management speak of this age" Jesus was doing exactly this, preparing the disciples to undertake the great commission, "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit" Matthew 28:19.

Being a disciple of Jesus is not about having a title or academic learning but is simply about being a learner and a follower of Jesus. We learn (now as then) by a combination of seeing, hearing and doing. Jesus is combining words and actions, vision and current reality, human need and our capacity to meet that need. Meeting that need is often described as "the mission of the church" but God's mission goes far beyond meeting the physical needs of one or other group of people, we do not undertake work that may take our interest and ask for God's blessing on it, instead we as the church, the collective body of Christ on earth (as with the first disciples) must first "learn and follow" together in love and truth with the beautiful harmony of an orchestra.

Consider the teaching of Jesus as "gifts" to the disciples (and to us) within this passage with these helpful subtitles which come from Isaiah 11:2-3.

Wisdom: We see God at work in our lives and in the world. For the wise person, the wonders of nature, historical events, and the ups and downs of our lives take on deeper meaning. The matters of judgment about the truth and being able to see the whole image of God. We see God as our Father and other people with dignity. We are able to see God in everyone and everything, everywhere.

Understanding: We comprehend how we need to live as a learner and follower of Christ. A person with understanding is not confused by all the conflicting messages in our culture about the

right way to live. The gift of understanding perfects a person's speculative reason in the apprehension of truth. It is the gift whereby self-evident principles are known.

Counsel (Right Judgment): We can know the difference between right and wrong, and we choose to do what is right. A person with right judgment avoids sin and lives out the values taught by Jesus. The gift of truth that allows the person to respond prudently, and happily to believe in Christ as our the Lord.

Fortitude (Courage): We overcome our fear and are willing to take risks as a follower of Jesus Christ. A person with courage is willing to stand up for what is right in the sight of God, even if it means accepting rejection, verbal abuse, or even physical harm and death. The gift of courage allows people the firmness of mind that is required both in doing good and in enduring evil.

Knowledge: We understand the meaning of God. The gift of knowledge is more than an accumulation of facts.

Piety (Reverence): We have a deep sense of respect for God and His people (the church). A person with reverence recognizes our total reliance on God and comes before God with humility, trust, and love. Piety is the gift whereby, at the Holy Spirit's instigation, we pay worship and duty to God.

Fear of the Lord (Wonder and Awe): We are aware of the glory and majesty of God. A person with wonder and awe knows that God is the perfection of all we desire: perfect knowledge, perfect goodness, perfect power, and perfect love. This gift is described by Aquinas as a fear of separating oneself from God. He describes the gift as a "filial fear," like a child's fear of offending his father, rather than a "servile fear" that is, a fear of punishment. Also known as knowing God is all powerful. Fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom (Prov. 1:7) because it puts our mindset in its correct location with respect to God: we are the finite, dependent creatures, and He is the infinite, all-powerful Creator.

Notice how in the passage Jesus provides clear instruction (verses 3 -11) as well as vision -how the task (what they are doing) fits into the vision of full harvest fields (verse 2). He makes them aware of the challenges they will face (verse 3) and what they must do to overcome them.

In summary; everything we need to know today about Christian mission is contained within these verses. It is under the instruction of Christ that we "go", we both "do (heal) and tell (proclaim)" we must all work together with clear communication, in harmony, for the benefit of the kingdom rather than for ourselves or the limited specific outcome of the task. Thanksgiving to God is essential and the belief of God as Father, Son and Spirit must be at the root of all we do. None of these factors are "optional extras" and from them will come the fruit that we so desire and from which we may rejoice that "our names are written in heaven" (verse 20).

Some day -perhaps today-when the world tells us we can no longer believe what the Bible teaches and only believe on their terms then God's people can look back and know that our beliefs were not taken from us, we gave them up, handed over bit by bit until we are left with nothing sacred, only an outward form. words from Methodist Circuit Rider (Local Preacher) Robert Sheffy (1820-1902).
