On 22nd March, the Presidents of Churches Together in England called for a National Day of Prayer and Action.

In a series of video messages released on 6th May, Presidents of Churches Together in England encouraged people to keep on praying in the midst of the Coronavirus pandemic. Archbishop Justin Welby: "We pray out of love to a God who is love" Pastor Agu Irukwu: "We have a Father who hears our prayers...Be encouraged that our prayers are not in vain." Archbishop Angaelos commented that the churches were presenting to the world many opportunities for acts of grace and kindness, but also asked that people continue praying "for our churches, our Church, for our nation, for our world." Archbishop Vincent Nichols: "It's God's work that we're involved in. And we need the help of God, and we need to pray for that continually." Revd Dr Hugh Osgood: "Let's keep praying and be assured prayer does make a difference."

The Trustees of CTE echo this, lending their support to CTE's Prayers of Hope initiative, which has included churches' united singing of The UK Blessing and Christians across the country being invited to join together in prayer at 7pm every Sunday evening, with resources and a weekly radio broadcast on Premier Christian Radio.

The Church in Dorset during Covid-19

Things have been very different for churches and ecumenical groups in Dorset. People have not been able to gather together inside church buildings; groups have not been able to hold face-to-face meetings; planned events such as Pentecost Sunday walks and have been postponed or cancelled; local initiatives such as Open the Book are not operating, and Boscombe Angels and Street Pastors are not patrolling.

However, the churches in Dorset have continued to explore different ways to be Church and to carry out mission together. Below are just a few examples:

Churches have continued to provide a range of live and recorded services via online platforms. Aside from this, Bournemouth Area Quakers have circulated quotations from the Bible and Quaker Faith and Practice, and have shared responses; the Roman Catholic in Weymouth has used Zoom and Skype video conferencing for bible study and reflection; from Ascension to Pentecost, the churches of Weymouth and Portland shared daily reflections, including a 24-hour online prayer meeting 'Thy Kingdom Come.' PACE (Programme for Applied Christian Education) has continued to provide free online assemblies and RE lessons for primary and secondary schools, which have been widely viewed during lockdown and which it hopes will be widely shared.

The Salvation Army BH1 Community Project in Boscombe has remained open (with social distancing measures in place). In the BCP area, local churches have worked alongside Faithworks to bring hope to the most vulnerable during the Coronavirus, and Dorset Council has also engaged with local churches. Churches in Weymouth and Portland have worked with local people, businesses and organisations to feed over 1,000

people during the pandemic, produced and distributed a leaflet informing people where they can get help, delivered food for the food bank and provided an emotional support helpline, whilst the Anglican and Methodist churches on the island have worked as part of a resilience group with volunteer groups and the local council to help ensure that nobody has been left behind during the crisis.

St George's Methodist Church, Boscombe have packed food parcels, which they have distributed to around 70 people, and their food bank has started cooperating with 'The Giving Stream' - the scheme whereby if a church buys a hamper, a second hamper is given to a family in need.

Churches have set up prayer and pastoral support systems. For example, the Quakers in Boscombe have been using Zoom so people who feel isolated might have a chat; Weymouth churches have been praying for each others needs, and their online coffee mornings have continued; the Roman Catholic Church in Weymouth has used the phone to contact parishioners who have relied on weekly get togethers through church services, lunch-clubs and house-groups, to catch up with them and see how they are doing, volunteers providing a listening ear and checking if they have any practical needs.

Churches across the BCP area have joined the prayer line initiative, Try Praying, and have engaged with Hope in the Community to create BCP - wide telephone befriending groups that link a volunteer (e.g. a church) with 3-4 older people who want a chat but do not use the internet.

Holiday Hunger This summer will be a tough one for families, as school vouchers will probably not be available during the summer holidays for families who normally get free school meals. As God's people, how can we show them they are not forgotten? Foodbanks will be issuing special holiday vouchers, but is there anything else that we could do as the Church to reach out to families in our local areas? Here are some ideas from Faithworks: one church is running 'Munch' - packed lunches for local families to collect; some churches are considering batch cooking for lone parent families; one church / food bank is adding activity books into the food parcels. Churches Supporting Care Homes: Prama are seeking input to creating a new Christian Care Network to support every care home in the conurbation through their local churches. 'Me, God and Covid-19' - Parenting for Faith

Printable pages to use with your family or share with families in your church, which it is hoped will serve as a springboard, facilitate many great conversations with children and help to capture where God was and how children connected with him in the midst of Covid-19.

Activities including: Draw a picture or diagram of God in your home with you: Where is He and what is He doing? Something I miss about church as a building. If I was in charge of online church, I would... God says He turns all things together for good (Romans 8:28): What good do you see happening because of Covid-19? Why do you think God made hearts that can be lonely? Who from the Bible would you pick to be in lockdown with? If God is everywhere, then why do we go to a church building? What emotions have you felt during your time at home? What will you miss about now when we can go back to normal life?
