


# Highcliffe and Bransgore Methodist Churches

and his faithfulness to all generations



### Scripture Reading: Luke 10: 25-37

- <sup>25</sup> On one occasion an expert in the law stood up to test Jesus. 'Teacher,' he asked, 'what must I do to inherit eternal life?'
- <sup>26</sup> 'What is written in the Law?' he replied. 'How do you read it?'
- <sup>27</sup> He answered, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength and with all your mind"; and "Love your neighbour as yourself."
- <sup>28</sup> 'You have answered correctly,' Jesus replied. 'Do this and you will live.'
- <sup>29</sup> But he wanted to justify himself, so he asked Jesus, 'And who is my neighbour?'
- <sup>30</sup> In reply Jesus said: 'A man was going down from Jerusalem to Jericho, when he was attacked by robbers. # Preaching Notes: these notes are a supplement to the weekly video which can be viewed on our YouTube channel.

To a respected Jew -as this "lawyer" or "expert in the law of Moses" certainly was - his question about what he must do to inherit eternal life was self-evident. He would have been familiar with passages such as Daniel 12:2 which states, "And many of those who sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake, some to everlasting life, and some to shame and everlasting contempt" and from the prophet Isaiah, "Your dead shall live; their bodies shall rise. You who dwell in the dust, awake and sing for joy! For your dew is a dew of light, and the earth will give birth to the dead" (26:19), the prophet Ezekiel, "For I take no pleasure in the death of anyone, declares the Sovereign Lord. Repent and live!" (18:32) and more is said in the Psalms and book of Proverbs. The lawyer already knew the answer, he wanted to see if Jesus did.

The Preachers Outline and Sermon Bible (POSB) states, "The lawyer was not seeking the truth. He was not really trying to discover the way to God. His purpose was to trip Jesus, to lead Jesus to discredit Himself by giving some unusual answer that would arouse the people against Him", to puff himself up, perhaps to present his credentials as knowing the law in more depth. Jesus was to have ongoing challenges from the lawyers/scribes and Pharisees, and he responded with clarity and without fear, "Woe to you lawyers as well! For you weigh men down with burdens hard to bear, while you yourselves will not even touch the burdens with one of your fingers" (Luke 11:46) and "Woe to you lawyers! For you have taken away the key of knowledge; you yourselves did not enter, and you hindered those who were entering." (Luke 11:52). The aim of the religious leaders in their interactions with Jesus was not to gain insight from Him but to have Him say something they could use to discredit Him in front of the people."

Bible versions translate the opening word of the passage differently, "Behold" (idou) indicates that something significant is coming that relates to

what has gone before, something that we should pay particular attention to in a way that, "on one occasion" or "just then" does not quite achieve.

The lawyer knows very well the scriptures, the Shema is quoted twice daily by Jews "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might" (Deuteronomy 6:5) and "you shall love your neighbour as yourself" (Leviticus 19:18). In shorthand, "Love God and love man". Joseph Parker (1830-1902) preacher and minister writes, "We must first be right with God, or we never can be right with man. If we begin by endeavouring to get right with our neighbour, we shall fail. But if we begin by establishing right relations with God, according to the conditions which he himself has laid down, we shall find that being right with God our whole life is elevated and all social relationships are redeemed from error, and our neighbour is loved with a lofty and pure charity." Unfortunately, many people only do one (to varying degrees), by loving God but not His people -the church- or loving people but not God, both are equally imperfect and lesser than what God intends for us. Derek Prince relates a beautiful image of the two aspects of the cross, the vertical that holds Christ's body, pointing to God and the horizontal, with Christ's arms outstretched to hold and gather people to Him, both are essential and inter-dependant to a living faith.

Jesus is absolutely not saying that the mercy and compassion showed by the Samaritan to the Jew who has been robbed, beaten and stripped will provide eternal life and a careful reading of what He says confirms that. Salvation is from belief in Christ alone not from good works (John 3:36 and Ephesians 2:8,9). What is being highlighted in Jesus telling of this stark and very memorable story of the good Samaritan is the recurring theme of an inner faith and love of God and others rather than an outward show (the Priest and Levite of the story). A knowledge of scripture is not the same as a desire to put it into practise in our lives. The lawyer is a real person and not a figure from a parable, perhaps he did "go and do

likewise", we can only respond for ourselves -to go and do, reaching the lost, making disciples, baptising and teaching. **Amen** 

**Offering:** Had we been meeting physically this is the point when we take up our offering for God's work.

**Prayer**: Lord we offer up our gifts, all things come from You and from Your hand we have gratefully received, at this time of giving, Lord we gladly and faithfully bring our offering for Your work. **Amen**

If you are met with struggles or hard times, or simply just a boulder in the road, try to face it instead of just walking around it- you never know what might be waiting underneath.
