Introduction to the reading.

There is often uncertainty about nicknames, are they a positive or negative thing to have. Some perhaps are affectionate words of acceptance but others are possibly ironic labels of ridicule. In Mark, when Jesus appoints twelve apostles, he gives Simon, first on the list, the nickname Peter. This seems ambivalent, perhaps as much 'rocky' as 'rock', as his faltering journey on the way of the cross later confirms. It seems extraordinary that Peter believes that Jesus is God's Messiah yet takes him aside to put him right! But by being open with Jesus, finding their relationship survives this rockiness of mutual rebuking, Peter will learn that God fulfils the promise inherent in Jesus' naming him as 'rock'.

Mark 8: 31-38

Then he began to teach them that the Son of Man must undergo great suffering, and be rejected by the elders, the chief priests, and the scribes, and be killed, and after three days rise again. He said all this quite openly. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. But turning and looking at his disciples, he rebuked Peter and said, 'Get behind me, Satan! For you are setting your mind not on divine things but on human things.'

He called the crowd with his disciples, and said to them, 'If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake, and for the sake of the gospel, will save it. For what will it profit them to gain the whole world and forfeit their life? Indeed, what can they give in return for their life? Those who are ashamed of me and of my words in this adulterous and sinful generation, of them the Son of Man will also be ashamed when he comes in the glory of his Father with the holy angels.'

On the second Sunday in Lent we place a purple cloth over the Lenten Cross as we remember that the call upon Jesus and upon us is not an easy one – it is costly and often counter cultural.

Prayer: Most holy God give us the desire to reject evil no matter how beneficial or popular it appears. Help us to seek to do the right thing even though it costs us dearly. Amen

Thought for the week:

How do you cope with disagreement? For lots of reasons, each of us reacts differently when people disagree with us or one another. Some can become quite aggressive and enjoy the argument; others can become silent and withdrawn.

What is the way that Christians should respond? Is the best way to be peaceful and calm, never to disagree? Maybe when the things we are disagreeing about are not especially important. But what if the thing we are disagreeing about is important or about truth and justice?

Jesus and Peter are an example of how open disagreement can lead to a place of understanding one another and God's way better. Jesus is trying to teach the disciples that the kind of Messiah that they have in mind is not quite right. They still seem to think that Jesus is going to be powerful and conquer the world. Jesus wants to show them that he is going to appear to do the opposite: he will be rejected, suffer and die.

But think carefully about the scene. Perhaps you know people, especially leaders, who you would be frightened to disagree with because they might reject you! Jesus seems to have created an atmosphere among his friends where they were not afraid. Peter is quite confident in his contradiction of Jesus. And Jesus is comfortable to disagree with Peter – very strongly. But is Peter kicked out of the group? Is Peter rejected? Far from it – in fact, just a few verses further in chapter 9, we read that Jesus chooses Peter with James and John for a special experience.

If we are to grow as people of faith, we need to be able to create an environment where we feel safe enough to disagree but know we will not be rejected. Can we do that?
