# Highcliffe and Bransgore Methodist Churches

Sunday 21<sup>st</sup> March 2021 Fifth Sunday of Lent Rev'd Phillip Dixon: "Encounters with Jesus – The Royal Official" John 4: 46-54.

Lent is the season in which we focus our eyes and hearts explicitly and intentionally on the cross of Christ. We lay aside our own desires and instead concentrate on our heart's deepest longing, for our lives to be fully in tune with His. In these five weeks of "encounters" we have been travelling inexorably to Jerusalem, the place of suffering, crucifixion and the joyous fulfilment of resurrection. We have met people whose lives were changed forever by their encounter with Him – in this final week it is the Royal Official who meets Jesus and his life, and that of his whole family is changed forever.

**Opening words**: Welcome to our time together on this fifth Sunday of Lent which some call "Passion Sunday". Though separated in person, we gather from our own homes in expectancy and desire to encounter Jesus in worship and praise. Physical separation from each other only heightens our love for God, knowing it is He who, by His Holy Spirt, unites us with one another.

"We proclaim to you the one who existed from the beginning, whom we have heard and seen. We saw him with our own eyes and touched him with our own hands. He is the Word of life." His name is Jesus! 1John 1:1.

# Scripture Reading: John 4: 46-54

<sup>46</sup> Once more he visited Cana in Galilee, where he had turned the water into wine. And there was a certain royal official whose son lay sick at Capernaum. <sup>47</sup> When this man heard that Jesus had arrived in Galilee from Judea, he went to him

and begged him to come and heal his son, who was close to death.

<sup>48</sup> "Unless you people see signs and wonders," Jesus told him, "you will never believe."

<sup>49</sup> The royal official said, "Sir, come down before my child dies."

50 "Go," Jesus replied, "your son will live."

The man took Jesus at his word and departed. <sup>51</sup> While he was still on the way, his servants met him with the news that his boy was living. <sup>52</sup> When he inquired as to the time when his son got better, they said to him, "Yesterday, at one in the afternoon, the fever left him."

<sup>53</sup> Then the father realized that this was the exact time at which Jesus had said to him, "Your son will live." So he and his whole household believed.

A time to pause, read again, pray, and reflect.

**Preaching Notes:** these notes are a supplement to the weekly video which can be viewed on our YouTube channel.

Within these nine short verses we have a message and testimony that encourages us to have full faith in Jesus Christ as the Son of God and the One who has come to reconcile the world to Himself. John's gospel is very uncomplicated and easy to follow when you keep in mind what he writes near the end (John 20:31)"But these (signs or wonders) are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name. John's gospel is breath-taking and beautiful in equal measure and for many Christians it is the most precious book of the New Testament. According to William Barclay "it is the book on which we can feed our minds, nourish our hearts and give rest to our souls". We use

the symbol of the eagle to represent this gospel because of all the living creatures it soars high above, giving a unique perspective and providing a penetrating gaze that can look directly at the sun and not be dazzled. John recounts for us seven specific signs with dialogue and encounters surrounding them. Our passage today is the second of these signs, the healing of the Royal Officials son.

Jesus is travelling and returns to Cana in Galilee from Judea. Much has happened since leaving Cana after the wedding and the water into wine. A visit to Capernaum with his mother and brothers and his disciples (John 2: 12). A Passover in Jerusalem with the incident in the temple turning over the tables (John 2: 13 onwards). The encounter with Nicodemus (in Jerusalem), the trip through Samaria and the ministry to the people there and now arriving back in Cana. There is so much we can only assume but it may be that the Jesus is there "cultivating the seed" from all that he did at the wedding feast amongst the guests, the servants and the couple themselves.

The Royal Official must have been a senior figure as he clearly "had his finger on the pulse" of where Jesus is. Perhaps a network of those loyal to the Royal Court of Herod? As soon as hears that Jesus has arrived he travels the 20 miles or so and goes to him. MacArthur states that, "The official's faith was little more than a desperate hope that led him to ask for Jesus' intervention....his belief in Jesus was not yet driven by a desire for salvation for his own soul, but by desperation for his son." How many of us have a similar story? A faith that started with a desperate need.

We do not know this mans name but by using the writings of later historians we can speculate that it may have been Chuza, Herod's steward.

At the conclusion of chapter 2 we read words that speak directly into this encounter "for he (Jesus) knew all people. He did not need any testimony about mankind, for he knew what was in each person" (John 2:24,25). Jesus knows the heart of this Royal Official and clearly feels great compassion upon him, although the words of the rebuke (verse 48) could say otherwise perhaps they were meant more for those around him who were looking for reasons to condemn Him. Spurgeon speaks of this Royal Official's condition with words that will encourage each person facing a crisis that brings them to Christ, "this nobleman came himself to Christ and personally 'besought him that he would come down and heal his son'. If your faith is weak in some respects, yet strong enough in others to drive you personally to Christ to pray to him, it is faith of an acceptable order. If it leads you to pray to our Lord with all your heart, beseeching him, then your faith is of the right sort. If it leads you to beseech Christ to have mercy upon you, it is the faith which saves the soul. It may be little 'as a grain of mustard seed', but its importunity shows that there is pungency in it; it is true mustard."

Note that the official does not react to Jesus' rebuke as one may expect but humbly requests that Jesus accompany him. It has not occurred to him that Jesus can perform this miracle (sign) without being physically present, his mind (and his faith) is immediately expanded.

American theologian and New Testament scholar Grant Osborne links the original, crisis faith that the Royal Official had, that which compelled him to make the journey and believe that Jesus could indeed save his son's life, with a trust and assurance that what Jesus said would indeed be accomplished, "The man's focus finally shifted to Jesus, and the man believed what Jesus said. His faith became properly centred on the power of Jesus' words, and he started home."

Osborne continues, "This is the key to a burgeoning faith, one that combines belief with response. The royal official proved the reality of his belief by beginning the journey back to Capernaum." The words of Jesus "your son will live" echoing in his mind.

We rejoice with the Royal Official, notice now described as "the father", as he discovers from his servants, coming to meet him from the

opposite direction, that his beloved son is living. Imagine his utter amazement and extraordinary joy when he is told that the fever left the boy at the exact time that Jesus confirmed to him that, "your son will live."

We conclude with the words of Baptist Pastor James Smith, "Some of God's brightest blessings come to us clothed in the dark weeds of mourning. If this nobleman's heart had not been moved through the sickness of his son, he never would have known the healing power of Jesus Christ through faith. Blessed is that sorrow which constrains us to go believingly to the Son of God."

From this sign his whole family and many other people came to believe and become followers of Jesus, then, and by a full understanding and a preparedness to believe, also now. The witness of the Royal Official continues throughout the ages, from generation to generation. **Amen** written by Rev'd Phillip Dixon
