Heather Smith *reflects on* John 14:8-17 [25-27]

People who have grown up without knowing their birth parents often want to find them, even though it can be a difficult, emotional process. It may not even be possible to find them, or to find who they were but that they have died. This desire to know our family origins extends beyond our parents – there is a huge interest in family history, with genealogy websites and even the celebrity programme, *Who Do You Think You Are?*

If you find out about your long-lost ancestors it might bring some surprises. For example, you might turn up something unexpected or even scandalous, which could give rise to bad feeling within the family. But for those who find a living parent, the emotional consequences can be huge.

Just before today's reading begins, Jesus talks about the Father: "If you know me, you will know my Father also." You can hear Philip's frustration as he says: "Lord, show us the Father, and we will be satisfied."

Someone meeting a relative for the first time might find astonishing similarities. Jesus' response is that anyone who has seen him has seen the Father. If we find striking resemblances to our only-just-met human relatives, Jesus resembles the Father even more, because the doctrine of the Trinity tells us there is no difference. If the Father seems elusive we need only look to Jesus. 🌿

God our Father, in you we live and move and have our being. Give us the grace, compassion and faith to treat all your children as our brothers and sisters. Amen.

People of the New Testament *Barnabas*

Barnabas is usually remembered as little more than Paul's sidekick, although this does no justice to his significance and his influence on Paul. We read of him in Acts, where he played a vital role in the early Church and he is also mentioned in 1 Corinthians, Galatians and Colossians.

In Acts he is part of the Jerusalem church founded by Jesus' followers shortly after his death. According to Luke, one of the remarkable

things about this church was the practical love these first believers showed one another, with the wealthier members sharing their material resources with those in need.

Barnabas was clearly a great man of God. He could discern the leading of God's Spirit, had the courage to step out in faith when others would not, he was a skilled mediator and possessed the courage to reach out with the Gospel. No wonder Luke is full of praise for him. Without Barnabas, Christianity would not be the cosmopolitan faith it is today – we owe him a great deal. 🌿

Part 5 – welcoming LGBTQ+ people

How can your church ensure it is known as a welcoming place for LGBTQ+ people? It is vitally important that churches make overtly clear that they are a safe place for LGBTQ+ people, otherwise many will just stay away – just think how exhausting it is to spend the whole service wondering if something might be said that will show you're unwelcome.

So what can your church do? Firstly, you need to be clear that

you do really want to welcome LGBTQ+ people. Discussing and agreeing the Inclusive Church statement (www.inclusive-church.org/the-ic-statement) is often a good start. You then need to make this decision visible – both on your website and in the church. Having LGBTQ+ people in leadership is also a wonderful way of letting others know that they are truly welcome, not just tolerated. The most important thing, though, is to "break the silence" – don't just assume that people know where you stand! 🌿
